A big thank you to Joan Whitten for presenting an excellent program on decorative cast ons at our March meeting. If you were unable to attend the meeting, all the great information that Joan gave us in a handout is available on the website.

Our April program will be "More than One Way to Knit a Bobble" presented by Carol Hayes. You will need to bring materials to practice bobble making: smooth worsted yarn of your choice needles to match yarn choice (6, 7, or 8) and do a small amount of homework: Cast on 39 stitches with your choice of cast on, knit (garter stitch) for 4 rows. There will also be a discussion of crochet bobbles.

In June, we will have a mini workshop on Double-Ended Tunisian Crochet presented by Merilyn Burnside. The workshop will take place after our regular business meeting on June 18. It will run for 3 hours from 1-4pm. The fee for the workshop is \$35 which includes instruction, materials and lunch.

During the workshop we will be making the Aida Cowl. Merilyn is providing, at a generous discount, all the materials need to make the Aida Cowl in kit form. The kits include the pattern, yarn and double-ended crochet hook all packaged in a gadget bag. We will have a sign up sheet and kits available at the April and May meetings. You must pay the workshop fee prior to picking up your kit. The fee is payable to Merilyn. Checks should be made out to: Colorways LLC.

About 30 of us met at 9 am at the Joslyn Center in El Segundo to board the bus, expertly driven by Bus Driver Donna. Approximately 1-1/2 hours later we were bumping along the country road to the Highland Springs Resort. The sun was shining and the weather was perfect. Cherry Valley is a beautiful area. The Resort offers lavender fields, hiking trails, a rustic lodge with restaurant facilities, cottages, goats and SHEEP! The Festival was set up near the lavender fields. There were vendors selling yarn, fleece, soaps made from goat milk and all sorts of crafts. We enjoyed a leisurely brunch and then ambled back to the Festival to see the last of the sheep being sheared. We had lots of laughs and CHOCOLATE on the bus ride home. 

## Down Under – a yarn about my vacation.

Our first "craft" stop was at the Bygone Beautys Treasured Teapot Museum in Leura. A truly fascinating establishment with a collection of over 3000 teapots, old and new. We enjoyed a delicious Devonshire Cream Tea as we viewed teapots, china and fine "tea nap" linens. Several beautifully handcrafted tea cozies, in a delightful array of colors and styles were for sale. I even found a granny square one, lined with flannel and complete with draw string for size adjustment. Of course this made me think of our very own granny square queen, Ellen Bloom. Check out their website at: www.bygonebeautys.com.au.

In nearby Katoomba, just as the rain started, and ten minutes before closing time, we stumbled upon the Granny Square Yarn Store. It boasted a colorful stock of beautiful merino wool, alpaca yarns and even the exquisite merino mink, a blend of merino and opossum. I learned from store keeper, Imogene, that although the sheep are raised in Australia the fleece is sent to China for processing and spinning. It then returns to Australia for sale. Most of the yarn mills in Australia have closed as they were not economically sustainable. Such is globalization and outsourcing. I purchased two fifty gram balls of beautiful baby soft bright red merino wool. Total cost about \$10 US. I am not sure yet what I will make with it but whatever it is, rest assured, I will bring it to show and share. Check out their website at: www.thegrannysquare.com.au In Bathurst we visited the Rankin Cottage, an absolutely wonderful little craft cottage with numerous unique hand crafted items including baby clothes, blankets, toys, sweaters and aprons. In the back room there was a colorful display of tasty home- made jams and jellies. Just as store keeper, Bev Johnson, explained to us, they truly have something for everyone from babies to grandparents. The store is run as a crafting cooperative. Many of the members are now on in years and some are in nursing homes, but they still knit and crochet to contribute to the shop. I purchased a cute little crocheted kangaroo which made me think of Kathy Bartholomew and her crocheted critters. Check out their blog spot at www.rankincottagecrafts.blogspot.com. Yes, they do take orders, but only by you coming in to the store so if you want to learn more I guess you'll just

have to pay the airfare.

A few days later, destination Goulburn, we stopped at the House of Alpaca, a factory and outlet shop specializing in Alpaca, Mohair and Lamb's Wool products. Check out the website at <a href="www.thehouseofalpaca.com.au">www.thehouseofalpaca.com.au</a>. Storekeeper, Glenys, provided us with a very informative, personalized tour. The alpacas are raised in Australia but fleece processing and spinning is out sourced to New Zealand. The yarn is then returned to Australia for weaving. The sweaters and wraps were soothingly soft. We learned about the manufacture of UGG boots, and the weaving of alpaca

wraps. To obtain the final soft fluffiness the finished cloth is brushed with teasels, a short of thistle like plant imported from Spain

A teasel.

What did I buy? Unfortunately nothing, as prices were above my budget. However, I noticed a bin of selvedge edge off- cuts from the looms. Not one to waste anything, I asked Glenys what would be made out of that. Nothing, apparently. By now, you've guessed I

was given a huge bag of this lovely soft, shaggy, scrap material. What will I make? That will be another surprise for our show and share.

Before leaving Goulburn, we just had to see The Big Merino, a huge concrete structure in the

shape of a merino sheep. This giant sheep's innards consist of gift and craft items including sweaters by designer Jane E. Slicer-Smith. Her label is Signatur Handknits. Check the website at: www.sigknit.com.au. My favorite was a beautiful purple patchwork cardigan at the handsome price of \$610 AU - about \$430 US. I am currently consoling myself and dreaming of perhaps purchasing a kit for the DIY version. Or should I settle for an acrylic, machine washable, look-alike version? According to the internet, kits are available either on line or our local Concepts in Yarn store in Rolling Hills. At the end of the trip we spent a day in Sydney and visited Morris and Sons, the mother ship for the Granny Square store in Katoomba. Check the website at:

www.morrissandsons.com.au. The upper floor was devoted to needlecraft items and fabric and the lower one to yarn. There were some lovely yarns, including Manos del Uruguay. What did I buy? A few pieces of fabric that I'll probably make into cushion covers. By now I was deeply concerned about getting the suitcase closed!

You'll be pleased to know I put the time in the air between

LA and Sydney to good use. It was a wonderful uninterrupted knitting opportunity!
